*A Fact for Southern Van Buren men.*—The following preamble and resolution of the Legislature of the State of New York we think will satisfy any reasonable man of Mr. Van Buren's views relative to the institution of slavery. He is said to be a "Northern man with Southern principles;" but let it be remembered that he advocated and voted for this resolution, which was intended to prevent the admission of Missouri into the Union unless she consented to manumit her slaves, thus exhibiting his love for the South. He never had and has not now, one feeling in common with the South, that is not affected, and all his boasted love for our institution is merely to cheat the people out of their votes. Read this.

*Preamble and Resolutions.*—Whereas, the prohibiting the further extension of slavery in these United states, is a subject of deep concern to the people of this State, and whereas, we consider slavery as an evil much to be deplored, and that every constitutional barrier should be interposed to prevent its further extension: and that the Constitution of the United States, clearly giving Congress the right to require of new States not comprised within the original boundaries of the United states, the prohibition of slavery, as a condition of their admission into the Union. Therefore,

*Resolved,* (if the honorable Senate concur therein,) That our Senators be instructed, and our Representatives in Congress be requested, to oppose the admission as a State, into the Union, of any territory not comprised as aforesaid, making the prohibition of slavery therein as indispensable condition of admission.

"On the 26th of January, 1820, the Senate took up the Resolution and passed the same unanimously, the following Senators being present.
