

and to obviate the necessity of establishing a United States Bank. This project of the Gen. if examined minutely, will be found with very little alterations, to accord very well with the views of a great portion of the whig party. For the advocacy of such doctrines Mr. Rieves of Virginia has brought down upon his head and all those who adhere to him, the most inveterate abuse and denunciation of the whole administration party, from Maine to Georgia. Yet the party in Marshall County have selected as their candidate, a man entertaining the same views and advocating the same policy which is denunced in another because, he opposed to Martin Van Buren for President. It is too, while they are claiming to be content in the support of measures. The views of these State Banks, according to Mr. Matthews' doctrine, are to be taken by the Government for dues; and what says the party to the union of the Government and State Banks?

Mr. Copwood, is for the State Bank system to be owned by the States entirely, with individual stock, that Mississippi purchase out the whole stock of the Union Bank, and make it strictly a State Institution.

Mr. Wall and Mr. Greer, go the "whole hog" for a gold and silver currency, apposed all kind of banks. This "Aumbagery," as called by the party in general, is the one subject upon which any two of them are in agreement. The subject of currency is the great dividing line between the great political
