 in the lands of Mississippi under the distress  
 warrant against him and his sureties.

I have also received the report of the District  
 Attorney on the subject; in which he confirms  
 your representation in regard to the lands belong-  
 ing to the Boston and New York Chickasaw Land  
 Company, and I have therefore written to Mr.  
 Butterworth, the District Attorney for the North-  
 ern District of Mississippi, directing that in-  
 structions may be given to the Marshal to with-  
 draw the levy from the lands of the Company and  
 also to file of record in the office of the clerk of  
 the District Court, where the levy is recorded a  
 supplementary return to that effect.
