"MEETING OF THE CITIZENS."

We delay the publication of our paper to give publicity to the proceedings of a meet- ing held in the Court House, on Saturda- the 21st instant, to devise ways and means to avert the impending storm which hangs over us, and to relieve us far as possible our present embarrassments. We forbear fur- ther remarks for the present, than merely giving the proceedings. Col. J. C. Alder- son being called to the Chair, and Jesse Lew- ell, Esq. appointed Secretary, J. L. Tot- ton, Esq. explained the object of the meet- ing in an eloquent and patriotic address, in which he lucidly portra- ed our situation. As f r as we c ould gather of his speech he as- sumed the following position, which we must say is both patrio: and praiseworthy. He thought there ought to be an interposi- tion on the part of the people—the legisla- ture had failed to effect a remedy; and that the message of Gov. McNutt did not speak the sentiments of the democratic party; and denied that it was the intention of the dem- ocratic party to destroy credit—boldly said that he message was utterly at variance with the principles of the party. He also took the ground that it was not an object of the party to which he belonged to destroy the Un on Bank, and that McNutt had once prophecied evil to the Institution, and to verify his pro- phecies set about to effect the destruction of the bank. And how could the recommen- dations of the message have any other effect than to destroy the credit of the people and the banks—self preservation had taught us to take a decided stand upon the question— We should not stand with our arms folded and for fear of making an inroad upon the popularity of our man, witness calmly our own destruction. The time had arrived when it became the people to speak for them- selves—the object of the meeting was more than paramount to mere party considerations—the object of the meeting was of a holier purpose; and if it was expected of him to look beyond the interest of the people for the mere gratification of the ambitious views of party leaders, they might look in vain,— the welfare of his country had ever been his polar star; and concluded by inviting the friends of all parties to join in the good
