*Resolved,* That the Court, the members of the Bar and the officers of the court will wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days.

*Resolved,* That we will as a body attend his funeral.

*Resolved,* That one of our body be deputed to request the enrolment of these resolutions on the records of the next court at this place.

*Resolved,* That these resolutions be published in the papers of this place, and that a copy be transmitted to his friends Widow and Mother.

On motion Resolved that A. M. Clayton Esq., be deputed to carry out the object indicated in the third resolution.
