And whereas the introduction of negroes and private servants of the prosecutor as witnesses to testify against the characters of gentlemen of the Navy, in the service of their country, is a practice though sanctioned by the President of the United States, that will not be justified, and ought not to be tolerated by Southern men, or Northern men with Southern principles, and if not corrected, must operate as a serious injury to the Navy, to the humiliation of its officers, and to the infinite discredit of the Government.

Resolved, therefore, That the Secretary of the Navy be required to communicate to this House a copy of the proceedings of the court-martial held for the trial of Lieut. George M. Hooe, that his wrongs may be promptly redressed, and the evils complained of corrected without delay.

AMOS KENDALL has given thirty dollars to the sufferers at Natchez. He says in the same letter in which he makes the donation that he is receiving one thousand subscribers per day, which, if he speaks the truth, is one thousand dollars, and a profit of five hundred dollars a day to him. His salary as Postmaster General was five thousand dollars IN SPECIE a year, which office he resigned for his present more lucrative position. He receives only five thousand a year, which will not buy more than ten thousand dollars would two years ago, and he has actually given thirty dollars out of it, which is thirty per cent. of what he draws from Natchez in the shape of subscriptions. Let the office-holders hold on to their fat offices and keep experimenting. You will have to sweat a little more and earn a little less, that is all. Let the government (i. e. office-holders) take care of itself, and you take care of yourselves, the best way you can, for charity's sake.
