Memphis and Holly Springs Stage Line.

THE undersigned would respectfully in-
form the travelling public, that he has pur-
chased Jefferson's splendid and swift line of
four-horse mail coaches, which will run as
usual from the Exchange Hotel, Memphis,
to Holly Springs, via North Mt. Pleasant,
through in one day. Leaves Memphis Mon-
days, Wednesdays, and Fridays, at 6 A. M.
returns Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays
at 6 P. M. At Holly Springs this line in-
tersect the main line through Lagrange on
to Bolivar and Nashville. It will also con-
nect at Holly Springs with the main line
leading to the south, viz: through Wyatt,
Oxford, Coffeeville, Grenada, Carrollton,
Lexington, Benton and to Yazoo city. There

sire to travel. The coaches and stock on the
