OBITUARY

Departed this life on Saturday, at 4 o'clock P. M. the HON. FELIX GRUNDY, of this city, in the sixty-seventh year of his age, a Senator in Congress from Tennessee. Mr. Grundy was by birth a Virginian. He was raised in the State of Kentucky, where he married, and at an early period of his life rose to eminence in his profession—that of the law. He was first a member of the Legislature, and afterwards a Judge of the Supreme Court of that State. The latter station he afterwards resigned and removed to Tennessee about thirty three or four years ago. He was a man of high order of talent, and as an advocate at the bar, he had few rivals and perhaps no superior in the West. His success in this branch of his profession did not so much depend on the magic of voice or manner—though there was nothing harsh or disagreeable in either, nor in the variety and extent of his legal acquirements—though in these he was respectable—but it depended still more upon his plain practical sense—his quickness in discovering the strong point of a cause—his great self-passion—his adroitness in the examination of witnesses, and his deep knowledge of the human heart, which he never fails him in the hour of need, accompanied with all the reasoning powers of his mind. We have said there was nothing remarkable in his manner—His style of speaking was the plain of common sense, yet he never failed in an important cause to excite the attention of his audience. He possessed an unusual amount of wit and humor—but it was not given to the wit that loved to play his words. And he never permitted himself to be drawn from the matter in hand—the only proof on this subject being that he never failed to prove on the subject he had undertaken. Mr. Grundy was elected to Congress in 1811 and served there until 1819. He afterwards returned to Tennessee and was elected to the Senate in 1820 when he was elected to the Senate of Tennessee. He served in the Senate until 1837. From his return to Tennessee in 1837 to 1840 he served in the Senate of Tennessee. He died on Saturday, Dec 11, 1840, at the age of 67 years.
