charters as with them.

Mr. Merrick said he would not contradict the assertion of the Senator from Ohio; but he must say, that his information was very different. The banks could do no business—they could not receive a dollar ton deposite, even from a member of Congress.

Mr. Tappan asked if the Senator had not read in the newspapers of the bay their

advertisements?

Mr. Mertick said those advertisements related to matters incident to the privileges granted by the act of the last session.

It was a matter of great moment to the people of this District that this matter should be speedily disposed of. Ever since the 4th of July last the inhabitants of this District have been deprived, by an act of Congress, of those privileges that were extended to the citizens of the circumjreent States.

Why was this? Why should they not be placed on the same footing as the inhabitants of Maryland and Virginia? He hoped that justice at least would que extended.

The object he had in naming Monday for its discussion was with a view to obta u an early action on the subject, in compliance with the anxious wishes of the citizens.

Mr. Clay, of Alabama, suggested that it would be better to fix the day for Thursday next; which Mr M. having acceded to, that day was fixed for the discussion.
