Memphis and Holly Springs Stage Line.

THE undersigned would respectfully inform the travelling public, that he has purchased Jefferson's splendid and swift line of four-horse mail coaches, which will run as usual from the Exchange Hotel, Memphis, to Holly Springs, via North Mt.
