FRANCE

M Thiers has been named not only pres-

PERILOUS POSITION OF LOUIS PHILIPPE.

The driver of a Paris Omnibus, dwelling
near the Barriere du Combat, was lately
found hanging in his room. Informed of
the fact, a commissary of police repaired
promptly to the spot, and finding all attempts
to restore animation ineffectual, proceeded
to secure the effects, and search the person
of the unhappy deceased. In one of his
pockets he discovered a written document,
by which the coachman declared that being
enrolled in a secret society, his turn had
taken place by lot to kill the King, but that
finding himself unequal to the commis-
sion of such a crime, he had determined to finish
his existence. The superior authorities
have taken the startling case in hand, and
serious apprehensions are entertained of the
confederacy whose existence has been thus
awfully divulged.

SPAIN.

We hear from Madrid, that the Spanish
Government has accepted the offer of Mr.
Aston, for the mediation of Great Britain
between it and Portugal, and that Espartero
has pledged himself, in the meantime, to
abstain from all offensive measures. It is
to be hoped that this statement is true, and
that Espartero is serious in abiding the re-
sult of Great Britain's mediation, as it is
well known that the conquest of Portugal
is a favorite measure with all Spanish lib-
erals, and that a war with a weaker power
would be most acceptable to the Spanish
army.

SYRIA.

RETREAT OF IBRAHIM PACHA FROM SY-
RIA.—At the same time that Mehemit Ali
learned the refusal of Admiral Stopford to
ratify the treaty he received an over-land
despatch from his son Ibrahim, stating that
he and his entire army in two divisions,
were in full retreat on Egypt. (The Pacha
says it consists of 30,000 men.) They had
kept together till their arrival at Mezareib,
southeast of Lake Tiberias, when one col-
umn, led by himself, crossed the Jordan,
and marched through the Naplaus, (a dan-
gerous route, through a hostile population,)
passing between Jaffa and Jerusalem, both
now in the hands of the Sultan, and pursu-
ing the coast road to Gaza and El Arich.
He expected to arrive at the former on the
