**FINANCING CHARGE.**  
udge was once obliged to deliv-

mand for his surrender made by the Govern-  
or of that State upon the Executive of Vir-  
ginia. Gov. GILMER replied to the demand  
that Carry would not be given up until the  
Governor of New York had complied with  
the demand heretofore made upon him by  
Virginia. This act of retaliation did not meet  
the sanction of the Legislature, and a resolu-  
tion expressing the disapprobation of that body  
of the course of Gov. Gilmer was passed, in  
the House by a large majority and unanim-  
ously in the Senate. In consequence of this  
action the Governor on the same day sent in  
his resignation. The Legislature has ad-  
journed without electing his successor.
