

caught fire They, consequently, felt no disposition to pay for the loss of property, at least until after a thorough investigation should take place.

One of the most important occurrences which we believe to have taken place during the "Talk" was, that they had heard that Government had intended to buy their land from them and drive them away, and that they wished to know the facts in relation thereto; because they were not disposed to make any sale or treaty until their last annuity should be paid and distributed among their nation. The Governor replied that he had no official information relative to the matter; but he was otherwise apprized that Congress had made an appropriation to defray the expenses of holding a treaty, and that it probably would not take place until after the payment of the present annuity.

It was not the intention of Government to use any coercive measures toward them, but to treat with them amicably, and to concert such measures as would lead to the mutual benefit of both the whites and Indians. To this the latter assentingly replied.
