Higher and brighter scenes, we trust, are now before him; and through grace, rewards and honors, infinitely greater than men can bestow, now rest upon him. If the day of his inauguration was a brilliant and glorious day for him, how much more brilliant and glorious the day on which he ascended to heaven! and if the shouts of the many thousands on earth, saluting him President of the United States, were joyous and thrilling, how much more joyous and thrilling the shouts of all the heavenly Host, in the world above, greeting him an heir of glory.—WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON, our beloved President, is gone! a nation weeps! but heaven rings jubilee.—millions on earth mourn his departure, but all in heaven shout Alleluia! for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth.
