

LATER FROM TEXAS.

The steamship Neptune, Captain Rollins, arrived yesterday from Galveston, bringing dates to the 2d inst. The N. had 38 cabin passengers and 100 bales of cotton.

News had been received at Galveston from Austin that the French loan had been negotiated at 94 cents. Whether any dependence can be placed upon it or not is more than we are able to say.

The French Minister, M. Saligny, is to reside at Galveston during the summer. The frigate Sabine was still lying off the bar at the latter place.

A company of Texan spies, under Captain Hays, recently had an encounter with a superior number of Mexicans near Bexar, killing three and taking twenty-five of them prisoners without the loss of a man. One of the prisoners informed Capt. Hays that Arista was in the neighborhood of Matamoras.

Major Ransom has been despatched from Austin to the East, to raise troops for the Santa Fe expedition.

The society in Brazoria county must be excellent. At the last term of the District Court the grand jury could not find a single indictment against any of the citizens of the county, although it is the most populous in Texas.

It was generally reported at Austin that there would be a called session of Congress, to meet about the 18th June.

Not a word is said in the papers of the rumored Mexican invasion, and every thing appears to be quiet throughout the Republic.

KINGDOM OF JERUSALEM.

The project of erecting Palestine into an independent State, to which the Jews might return with an assurance of protection and security, appears to be seriously entertained by some of the leading powers of Europe. A word from Prince Metemich and Lord Palmerston would, it is stated, settle the matter. The following extract from a letter received in this city from a gentleman of high standing in the literary and diplomatic circles of Berlin, dated Feb. 15, serves to show that the subject has not been lost sight of, and is perhaps brought nearer to some important decision than the public are aware of:—"The allies having obtained their end [in Syria] are somewhat at a loss how to dispose of their conquest. They are seriously thinking of setting up or reviving a Christian kingdom at Jerusalem—a project which seems to be received with favor at Vienna. But then what are they to do with the other Christian population of Syria? This is one of the questions which France has asked them. They are now very anxious to draw her from the isolated position into which they have forced her; as they found after all, that they cannot permanently and satisfactorily settle the East without her concurrence."

Gentlemen who have paid particular attention to some of the remarkable prophecies of the Scriptures, believe that they see in the leading political events of the day many indications of the near approach of the millennium, when all nations shall be brought to the worship of the true God. The return of the Jewish nation to Palestine, and the resumption of worship in the temple at Jerusalem, are regarded as among the events which must necessarily happen before that great purpose is accomplished. The political movement here spoken of, taken in connexion with the efforts of missionaries, who have obtained a footing on almost every section of the globe, may serve to show that the millennium era is probably not as far distant as the thoughtless affect to believe. The subject is one that affords food for much reflection, and the proceedings of the allied powers in regard to the Holy Land, will therefore be watched with absorbing interest.—*American Sentinel.*
