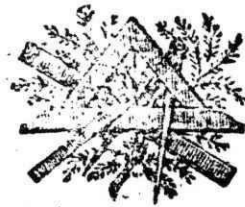

ALEXANDER McLEOD.—Unexpectedly
to most of our citizens, the name of Alexander
is to be honored to day with that of a pris-
oner whose name has excited so many re-
marks and so much feeling upon both sides
of the Atlantic. McLeod was in Albany
yesterday, from Niagara; and by appoint-
ment, was to leave last evening for New York.
He comes here under hope of escape from
custody, by *habeas corpus*. A motion will
be made to discharge him in the Court now
in session, and for the purpose of getting rid
of the prisoner. What will be the result de-
pends upon arguments and facts to be produ-
ced before the Court, and is therefore a mat-
ter of mere conjecture. Should the prisoner
not be set at liberty here upon the motion to
discharge, an early trial will probaly be had
elsewhere, and at whatever place may be ad-
vised through his counsel.

Arrival of M'Leod.—Alexander M'Leod
came to the city in the Albany boat. He is
in charge of the Sheriff, and though a pris-
oner of State, is suffered to go where he choo-
ses. He is, however, well attended by his
suit.—*Express.*

AWFUL MURDER.

On Monday, the 26 ultimo, a most horrid
tragedy was enacted in our sister county of
Weakley, Tenn., near Bowers' Mills, on the
north fork of Obion River. A trifling scound-
rel named George Warren, deliberately
murdered his neighbor and (as we are inform-
ed) brother-in-law, of the name of Wiley
Thomas, by beating him to death with the
pole of his axe, breaking his skull in three
places, and otherwise disfiguring him. The
more minute details of this shocking deed of
violence, have not yet reached us.—We are
glad to say, that the villian has been secured,
and is now confined in the Dresden jail, there
to await his trial. We are informed, that he
not only confesses the deed, but glories in its
fulfilment.—*Commercial Herald.*
