LATER FROM TEXAS.

The steamship New York, Capt. Wright, ar-
rived yesterday morning from Galveston, which
place she left on Sunday, 13th of June, at 10
A. M.

The papers do not contain a line of important
intelligence.

The Santa Fe expedition was to have left
Austin on the 8th inst.

The Presbyterians, and Catholic church
buildings in progress at Galveston, on commo-
dious and neat plans, and the Methodists have
raised a sufficient fund for the purpose, and will
commence their building immediately.

In the same place there are now between 150
and 200 children at school.

The San Augustine Herald says—"We have
directed our enquiries to many intelligent per-
sons on the subject of the present cotton crops
in the eastern section of this country, and from
the lowest estimate we can make from the re-
sult of our information, there will not be less
than 30,000 bales produced by the counties of
the east, without including Harrison or any of
Red River counties."

As a "sign of the times" the Heustonian no-
tices five large waggons in that city on the 9th,
loaded with cotton, about ten bales each, being a
part of the crop raised last year on the planta-
tion of David Randon, Esq., on the Brazos. Each
waggon was drawn by a team of ten or twelve
oxen.

A new paper called the *Croaker* has been
started at Galveston, edited by a committee of
fishermen styling themselves the "Centre of Grav-
ity Club." They seem to do business on their
own hook, and, judging from their lines, it is quite
a small fry concern.—*Picayune*.

near the South-west Pass, he had discovered
three dead human bodies—one partially buried,
and the other two floating in the bayou. This
information we learn was communicated to Re-
corder Baldwin, who sent an officer to the fish-
erman. The latter agrees to conduct any per-
son to the spot. Perhaps this may lead to some-
thing important.
