is highly proper. With such a properly enforced, we can agree to any project of a Bank within the limits of ordinary outlines of such institutions. I have briefly intimated a few points on which it strikes us, alterations might be advantageously made in the Secretary's system, and to adopt the language of the *National Era* in hoping "that those who believe in the efficacy of this character to be imperiously led by the great interests and existing exigencies of the country will come to a consideration of this plan with minds unprejudiced, and act upon it in that spirit of compromise without which great or important public purposes are rarely accomplished in a free and popular Government."
