

PUBLIC MEETINGS.

At a meeting of the people at Butler's Mills, Marshall County, Mi., to appoint delegates to represent us at a convention to be held at Holly Springs on the 2d Saturday in September, to nominate suitable candidates to represent us in the next Legislature, and after the business of the meeting was accomplished, the following preamble was adopted:

This meeting feel called on under considerations of an imperative sense of duty, in vindication of the sacred rights of the representative principle in free governments to express their decided condemnation of the conduct of the acting President of the United States, in his veto of the bill recently passed by Congress to establish a Bank of the United States.

We regard the act as one of perfidy to the most powerful majority who ever concurred in any system of measures, where there was controversy as to the wisdom of those measures.

We regard the silence of Mr Tyler during a heated and protracted canvass of those measures, and that which he has thought fit to veto particularly, as amounting to as direct an affirmation of his opinions as language or the most enduring memorials of it could possibly have made.

We consider that the open advocacy of Mr Clay by Mr Tyler, as a member of the Harrisburg convention, with Mr C's. known opinions as to the policy and expediency of a United States Bank, as a suitable nominee by that Convention for the office of President of the United States, to have been an indication of Mr Tyler's opinions on that subject which nothing short of an express disapproval subsequently and openly expressed, could now be heard to gainsay or contradict.

We believe that in the veto message, opinions are expressed and an intention displayed by Mr Tyler never conceived of until after the death of the lamented Harrison, by which event he succeeded by the forms of the constitution and not by the unbought suffrages of freemen to the possession of power, which he exercises without that sense of gratitude and those obligations of good faith

Persuant to previous notice, a large and respectable portion of the whigs of Lamar & vicinity assembled, at the methodist church, when on motion of John Caruth, James Cooper was called to the chair, and J. F. Dowdy, appointed secretary, whereupon, the following gentlemen were recommended to the consideration of the convention to be held at Holly Springs, on the 11th inst. as suitable persons to represent this county in the next legislature:—
