to protect him. There is said to be a "band  
of desperate men—probably Canadian refu-  
gees—who have bound themselves by the  
most horrid oaths not to permit McLeod to  
return to Canada alive.

A letter in the Boston Atlas, dated, St. Al-  
bans, Sept. 23, gives the following account  
of a high handed step by the Canadians:

It appears from depositions taken in the  
case before the proper authorities, that the  
dwelling house of Wm. Brown, of Alburgh,  
was broken open and entered by a gang of  
armed men, in the uniform of British sol-  
diers, about three o'clock on the morning of  
the 20th Sept.; that said Wm. Brown was a-  
wakened from his sleep by a noisy rush of  
men into a bed room adjoining the room  
where he and his wife were sleeping; that  
said Brown, calling to his sons and giving the  
alarm, was met at the door of his room by a  
man armed with a gun and bayonet, who  
threatened to shoot him if he made the least  
noise; that the remainder of the party, con-  
sisting of twelve or more, rushed into the  
adjoining apartment, where was sleeping  
James W. Grogan, and cried out as they en-  
tered, "Here he is!"—"shoot him!—blow  
his brains out!" that they seized said Grogan  
and dragged him from his bed and from the  
house, after gagging him, and thrust him in-  
to a wagon, which was at a convenient dis-  
tance from the house, and drove off towards  
Canada.

Another deponent testifies that on Mon-  
day, about 11 o'clock A. M. he met the same  
wagon and the same driver, whom he had  
seen the night before, with Grogan and four  
armed British dragoons, and four more drag-  
oons mounted, who rode near the wagon, and  
were on their way from Clarenceville, in  
Canada, towards Missisquoi Bay Village.—  
Col. Grogan was badly wounded, and almost  
entirely naked.

**NEW STATE.**—The Huntingdon Ad-  
vertiser, proposes to form a new State, by
