NAVAL INTELLIGENCE

NORFOLK OCTOBER 24

The frigate Macedonia and sloop of war  
 Concord left New York on the 17th instant,  
 and anchored in Janyhaver Bay on the  
 22nd. Both the Macedonian and Concord  
 have since come up and anchored off the  
 Naval Hospital.

These ships are a part of the West India  
 Squadron under the command of Capt. JES-  
 WILKERSON, who will hoist his broad pen-  
 nant on board the Macedonian, and sail in a  
 few days for the West India Station. Cap-  
 tain SHUBRICK, now in command, will re-  
 main and take charge of the Gosport Navy  
 Yard, to the command of which he has been  
 appointed in the place of Commodore WAR-  
 RINGTON, who takes his seat at the Navy  
 Board

We learn that Commander C. K. STRIB-  
 LING has been detached from the United  
 States Rendezvous at this station, and received  
 orders for the Navy Yard, Washington.

We also learn that Lieutenant L. Saun-  
 ders has been ordered to the Macedonian as  
 her First Lieutenant.
