**FEMALE INSTITUTE**

THIS Institution will be opened as previously contemplated, on the first Monday in January next, in the building directly opposite the residence of H. M. Lusk, Esq. The faculty of Teachers, in all the departments, is not yet fully organized; but so far as completed, consists of Rev. C. A. FOSTER, Rector and Principal. Rev. A. P. MERRILL, Associate Principal. Mrs. A. P. MERRILL, Preceptress. Mrs. Y. T. NEWSUM, Teacher of Music. The faculty of Teachers will be strengthened as the wants of the school demand.

Efforts are now making to procure the services of a lady of distinguished talents and attainments, from Virginia, who will assist the present faculty in the higher departments.

The Preceptress, in addition to the duties of in- struction, will exercise a vigilant watch-care over the manners, morals and general deportment of the young ladies committed to her charge.

No pains will be spared on the part of the faculty to contribute in forming the character of the pupils, after the most approved models of excel- lence as developed by refined society and christian morality.

A strict and uncompromising discipline shall be maintained, without which all efforts to teach must prove vain and useless. Although firm and inflexible, it shall be tempered with kindness and affection, and therefore no young ladies will be received as members of this Institute, whose parents or guardians will not yield to this highly necessary and salutary regulation.

The year will be divided into two sessions of five months each.

TUITION.—One half payable in advance, and the balance at the end of the session; or, if parents desire it, the first session in advance and the balance at the end of the year.

No pupil received for less than a session. No deduction for absence, except in cases of protracted sickness. Pupils entered any time previous to the middle of the session, will be charged the same as if entered at the beginning.
