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**CONTINUED EXCITEMENT AT PHILADELPHIA**  
—GREAT RUN UPON THE BANKS—INJUNCTION UPON THE BANK OF PENNSYLVANIA

The Philadelphia correspondent of the Journal of Commerce, under date of Monday evening, says: The City is still in the greatest commotion—even greater than on the failure of the Girard on Wednesday and Thursday last. The league formed by the Banks to sustain each other has not had the effect to restore quiet. The Brokers, and all men of business, stand aghast. They are doing comparatively nothing, having no confidence in any description of our currency. The crowd that was left around the Pennsylvania Bank on Saturday at 3 o'clock, had congregated in an equal number on the hour for opening this morning. The doors, however, were not opened. On them were posted a notice that an injunction had been applied for on behalf of the Commonwealth, and on notification of this fact from the Governor, the notice stated that at the Bank would not open.

Notwithstanding this announcement the crowd still hung about the institution until after 10 o'clock when a shower of rain dispersed them. The injunction was applied for by the Attorney General to the Supreme Court as soon as it opened, and was at once allowed. The process on the Bank to shew cause why a receiver should not be appointed to take charge of the assets of the institution was made returnable on Monday next. The Attorney for the Bank was present, and offered no objection, as he said he wa
