TEXAS NEWS.

Our doubts, expressed last week with regard to the Mexican Invasion, are confirmed by the last reports from Texas. It is now admitted, that not more than 1000 Mexicans have made their appearance; these, however, are supposed to be the van guard of a more numerous army. They were retreating from the last accounts, before Gen. Burleston with 1500 men. We presume the Mexicans are preparing to make a desperate effort for the recovery of Texas. It is quite probable, that they have been secretly encouraged by the British Abolitionists, and that this country may finally become engaged in a war with Great Britain. *Let it come.* If not prepared, we are willing. A martial spirit seems to pervade among us. We have heard for several days the stirring sound of the fife and drum. A small but determined company under the command of W. G. WILSON, Esq., will leave this morning for the seat of war. A meeting of the citizens was held on Monday last at the Court House, and several spirited speeches, we understand, were made. Memphis, Somerville and La Grange are exhibiting the same spirit to a greater or less extent. The tone of Gen. Houston's Proclamation is bold and fearless. He may yet plant his standard upon the walls of Mexico, and "revel in the Halls of Montezuma."

The Chairman appointed Mr. McLain, Capt. Chew, Gen. Guy, Thomas J. Oliver and Mr. John Finley to compose that committee.

On motion the following gentlemen were added to the committee: Hon. F. W. Huling, Col. Wm. Davis, Robert Josselyn, Esq. and Mr. Benj. Williams.

On motion, the meeting then adjourned to meet on Saturday next.

HOLLY SPRINGS, March 26, 1842.

The citizens of Marshall county met this day pursuant to adjournment for the purpose of receiving the report of a committee appointed at a former meeting to draft a constitution and further to organize an agricultural society. The committee being present made their report, which report was received and unanimously adopted:

The following resolutions proposed by Col. Wm. Davis, were unanimously adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That until this society is organized by the election of its officers as provided in the Constitution, that JAMES W. HILL be appointed Treasurer pro tem., and that he be authorised to receive all monies collected and received by the several agents appointed to solicit members and receive the member fee.

Resolved, That at our next meeting, convened for the purpose of electing officers as provided in the Constitution; a list of the subscribers who have paid their member-fee, shall be called, and as their names are called to vote, but no subscriber to be called or allowed to vote who has not paid said fee.

Resolved, That Thomas B. Coleman, Angus Gillis, Wm. Lumpkin, James B. Nunnally, Anthony P. Armistead, Leander R. Guy, Robert Ralford, Euclid Bourland, Col. Benton, Parris Gorman, Joseph W. Matthews, James McReynolds, Byrd Hill, Paul Read, Benj. Cottrel, Charles L. Thomas, Wm. Coopwood, Major Harper and George H. Wyatt, be appointed agents to solicit members and receive the fee, and on or before the first Saturday in June next, report the names of persons and amount of money and by whom paid, to James W. Hill, treasurer, and that he report the same to the society at our said next meeting.

14. This Constitution may be amended by the concurrence of two thirds of the members present at the annual meeting of the society.
