Constitution of the Marshall County Agricultural Society.

1. This Society shall be called the Marshall County Agricultural Society, for the improvement of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts.

2. The Society shall be composed of such members as shall subscribe to the Constitution and pay the Treasurer two dollars at the time, and two dollars annually thereafter as long as they shall continue members.

3. The Officers of the Society shall be a President and three Vice Presidents, a Recording and Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer and Executive Committee of five persons, being members.

4. The officers shall be elected by the members present, the vote being by the ballot of the house, and no one to be considered as elected but by a majority of the members in attendance. All other elections shall be held annually, and conducted in like manner.

5. The President, or in his absence, senior Vice President, shall preside in all the meetings, fair &c. of the society and perform such other duties as are incident to the chair

6. The President shall have power to appoint all committees, and call a meeting of the society as often as he may think it useful to the cause of agriculture, or any of the objects of this society.

7. It shall be the duty of the President to attend to any business pertaining to the business of the society, not provided for in this constitution.

8. It shall be the duty of the President, together with the Executive Committee, to select some suitable person to read an essay upon some subject, connected with agriculture at the annual meetings of the society.

9. The Recording Secretary shall keep fair and correct minutes of the proceedings of the society; take charge of its books and papers, and have them at each meeting, and perform such other duties as may be required by the Society or President.

10. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of this society with other societies and persons upon agricultural subjects, make a written report on the first day of each annual meeting, giving satisfactory exhibits of all correspondence accompanied with such letters and documents as he may have received for the benefit of the society.

11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect all moneys due to the society, and to
