**MELON AND STRAWBERRY SEEDS** seldom fail by age or other cause but when they fail to grow, owing to the cold or wet. These and some other varieties rot if sown too early and is sufficiently warm. I have seen them often fail from the same cause. I have seen them succeed in the same soil.

A tree of the same size was selected, which was cut square off a little distance above the ground the surface of both made smooth, and the graft or rather tree placed in its new position by the operation of pie grafting. Grafting clay was placed around the junction, earth heaped over the spot and the tree strongly secured by stakes. **RESUMPTION IN MARYLAND.**—The Baltimore American of Wednesday, May 4th says—"On Monday last the banks of our city and State entered upon a general resumption on all liabilities—Virtually, specie payments took place here some four or five weeks ago when the banks began the issue of small notes of one and two dollars. The effects of these issues have been and continue to be most salutary. They are gradually replacing the small note currency of inferior worth which circulated previously, and by rendering coin less requisite for purposes of change, the demand for specie has been very trifling. The amount drawn from the banks has been much less than the amount deposited. We learn in fact (from an unquestionable source,) that since the resumption, the banks in the city have received upwards of two hundred thousand dollars in specie more than the sums paid out by them."

**MONEY MARKET.**—The banks continue to check freely on the East at 4 premium. Indiana bank paper is now bought at 4—sold at 3. State Bank of Illinois, 50 a 60. Little doing in Indiana Treasury notes, which are taken at 55 on the dollar—sold at 60 a 70. Tennessee, 17 a 18 dis. Alabama, 25. New Orleans, 6; merchants and mechanics' Bank of Wheeling, 10 dis. New Albany Insurance Company, 4. Virginia, 5 a 7½ dis. Indiana, 4; scrip at 45. Bank of Illinois, at Shawneetown, 12½, scarce.

**Cincinnati Banks.**—Commercial Bank, Franklin Bank, Lafayette Bank, and Ohio Life and Trust Company pay specie. Mechanics and Traders' Bank, 2 dis. at Cincinnati. The par at Cincinnati is Indiana bank paper, and specie is quoted at 6 prem.

**Interior Ohio.**—The following banks are at par with Indiana paper at Cincinnati: Banks of Massillon, Xenia, Sandusky, Marietta, Mount Pleasant, Norwalk, Geauga, Zanesville, Circleville (H. Lawrence cashier), Belmont Bank of St. Clairsville, Clinton Bank at Columbus, Columbian Bank of New Lisbon, Commercial Bank of Scioto, Farmers and Mechanics' Bank of Steubenville, Bank of Wooster, Muskingum Bank, Western Reserve Bank, and Dayton Bank. These banks are at uncertain rates of discount here, none being offered.
